What an incredible year it has been! The COVID-19 pandemic had a profound impact on all of us, from our students trying to learn, to our faculty who shifted countless courses online, to our staff who provided much needed support to our students. I was overwhelmed at the resilience of our campus community who met the challenges head-on with resolute action. Our School of Advanced Manufacturing, Industry, Technology and Trades will be getting a new trades building very soon. The facility is being designed by ADW Architects and will allow the College to expand existing programs and add new construction-related programs. The new facility will house classrooms and labs for welding, machining, mechatronics, heavy equipment, electrical lineworker, HVAC, carpentry, electrical, and plumbing. Flexible lab space for industry training is also part of the new building. We anticipate groundbreaking for the new building in 2022. Once the building is completed in 2023, existing space on campus will be freed up to add a new training program in automotive maintenance.



Our School of Business and Transfer launched two new degrees, the Associate in Arts Teacher Preparation and the Associate in Science Teacher Preparation. Both degrees will fuel the pipeline for future teachers in North Carolina, as well as position the College to train and recruit future teachers.

Our School of Health Sciences and Public Services continues to teach students about industries expected to grow over the next decade. Even amidst COVID-19, 100% of the 2020 Annie Ruth Kelley Associate Degree Nursing (ADN) graduates were able to pass the NCLEX-RN and begin working as Registered Nurses. This class was instrumental in the program's national accreditation process with the National League of Nursing Commission for Nursing Education Accreditation, which was awarded in February 2021. The rigorous accreditation process involved both nursing faculty and nursing students over several years. The nursing program at SCC meets standards of the Commission of Nursing Education Accreditation signifying the program's strength through evaluating data collected for all program components. This achievement indicates that SCC's ADN program consistently places highly competent nurses into the workforce.

Our College Foundation continues to make college affordable and accessible for students through scholarships, grants, and student aid. We are thankful for the support of individuals, dedicated community partners, and forward-thinking corporations who give so generously to the College. This support makes it possible for us to continue to offer the exceptional education for which we are known and stay focused on what matters most—our students.

The College's 2021-2024 strategic plan is complete and will be available for your viewing in the coming weeks. We anticipate many great accomplishments in the years ahead. Sustaining success requires a clear focus on our future.

SCC Responds to COVID-19

Stanly Community College responded to the COVID-19 outbreak by doing what we do best–providing education. SCC made its first college-wide communication regarding college safety practices for respiratory illnesses on January 31, 2020, the day after the World Health Organization (WHO) declared COVID-19 a public health emergency of international concern. All college-related travel was banned on March 12, one day after WHO characterized COVID-19 as a pandemic. SCC remained open by remote operations effective March 21, 2020. Limited on-campus operations resumed June 4 with written guidance for employees provided a few days before.

A COVID climate survey has been available daily since March 30, 2020, for students to request assistance. SCC has attempted to mitigate the impacts for our students. SCC was well-positioned prior to the COVID-19 outbreak to provide what is called Hy-flex instruction, which means that SCC had classes that could be held face-to-face in a classroom with a live-stream online (synchronous) and recording for future viewing (asynchronous).

Other programs had to pivot rapidly to adopt the changes. Combinations of face-to-face, synchronous, and asynchronous instruction are now the norm. SCC distributed Chromebooks, heightened on-campus access to broadband, and offered Wi-Fi hotspots* to help with students' limited access to technology. Online services increased for academic support in tutoring, counseling, and a variety of advising support.

A new Student Assistance Program was developed to help students with their increased mental health needs. Over \$365,000 in federal funds were distributed in April 2020 for student emergency fund grants. Employees have also needed extensive technology upgrades to support their remote work, including Wi-Fi hotspots. SCC employee jobs have not been affected by the pandemic, but many of their family members' jobs have. SCC volunteers continue to provide help when needed. This program provides the skills required to install, service, and maintain computers, peripherals, wired and wireless networks, and microprocessor and computer-controlled equipment. It includes training in both hardware and software with emphasis on operating systems concepts, data security, and data recovery.

Coursework includes mathematics, physics, electronics, digital circuits, and programming with an emphasis on the operation, use, and interfacing of memory and devices to the CPU. Additional topics may include communications, networks, operating systems, programming languages, Internet configuration and design, and industrial applications.

Graduates should qualify for employment opportunities in electronics technology, computer service, computer networks, server maintenance, programming, and other areas requiring knowledge of electronic and computer systems. Graduates may also qualify for certification in electronics, computers, or networks.

Graduate Finds Passion as Radiologic Technologist



When Joey Wittman is not busy fishing, boating, or spending time with his family, you can find him at Atrium Health Stanly performing diagnostic imaging. Joey, who is a Radiologic Technologist (R)(CT)(MRI) at Atrium Health Stanly, completed his training for Computed Tomography (CT) and Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) at Stanly Community

College (SCC) in 2013 and 2018, respectively. Joey chose SCC to complete his training because it was economical and convenient. "I wanted to become more versatile at work and to be able to work in multiple imaging modalities. I chose to take my training at SCC because it was affordable and the online classes worked around my busy schedule," Joey said.

His biggest challenge during his training was time management. "Working a full-time job and a part-time job while trying to spend quality time with my family, while staying on top of my training, proved to be a challenge. However, the instructors were only a phone call or email away, and they even helped me with the registration process. Right now my biggest challenge is COVID-19," he said.

Joey recalls helping patients as a teenager. "When I was in high school I started out working as a patient transporter, which is someone that takes the patients from their rooms to the imaging department. I knew then that I liked the radiography field and have been in it ever since. I can honestly say that the most rewarding part about my career is interacting with patients and being part of a team that provides potentially lifesaving care in one of the most trying times of a patient's life."

Joey was nominated for the Atrium Pinnacle Award. This award recognizes outstanding teammates who model the system's Core Values of Caring, Commitment, Integrity and Teamwork. He is a member of the SCC Radiography Advisory Committee, and is a part-time clinical instructor for the Radiography program at SCC.

Radiography Technology

The Radiography curriculum prepares the graduate to be a radiographer, a skilled healthcare professional who uses radiation to produce images of the human body.

Coursework includes clinical rotations to area healthcare facilities, radiographic exposure, image processing, radiographic procedures, physics, pathology, patient care and management, radiation protection, quality assurance, anatomy and physiology, and radiobiology.

Graduates of accredited programs are eligible to apply to take the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists' national examination for certification and registration as medical radiographers. Graduates may be employed in hospitals, clinics, physicians' offices, medical laboratories, government agencies, and industry.

EMT Students Prepare for NCOEMS Exam



Students in the Emergency Medical Technician program at SCC had an opportunity to visit with the MedCenter Air (MCA) flight team, with Atrium Health Medical Center located in Charlotte. Bryan Woodard, SCC EMT Instructor, stated, "Each year during EMT class the MCA flight team fly out to the location of the class so the students can see the helicopter and meet the staff. The students have the chance to talk with nurses and pilots about the function of the helicopter, how to set up landing zones, what treatments the crews can do, and how fast they are able to transport someone to a trauma center. We call it the "golden hour," which is the time from injury until surgical intervention." Once students in the EMT class complete all requirements, they will be ready to take the North Carolina Office of EMS (NCOEMS) exam.

Students Complete Electrical Lineworker Training

Students completed their 12-week training program for the Electrical Lineworker certificate. The Electrical Lineworker program teaches students basic elements of electricity, overhead pole and electrical line construction, safety codes and applications, electric power systems, as well as transformer and meter installations. On successful completion of the program, students possess the necessary skills for employment in various electrical utility industries. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, a graduation ceremony was held outside the Snyder Building on the Albemarle campus. Family and friends remained in their vehicles in the Snyder Building parking lot and were able to watch the ceremony on the College's Facebook Livestream page.

New Degrees & Mobile App

Two New Teacher Preparation Transfer Degrees

SCC has launched two new and exciting teacher preparation transfer degrees. Both degrees, the Associate in Arts Teacher Preparation (AATP) and the Associate in Science Teacher Preparation (ASTP), will help fuel the pipeline for future teachers in North Carolina, as well as position the community colleges to train and recruit future teachers.

Both curricula are designed for students who wish to work as teachers in the K-12 school system and transfer to study their baccalaureate degree in teaching in a non-STEM major (AATP) or a STEM major (ASTP).

The degrees are comprised of 14 hours of EDU courses, and the remaining hours will follow the university general education requirements of the traditional Associate in Arts or Associate in Science degrees. In addition, a high school program has been established through the Career & College Promise (CCP) pathway for students to start earning their college credit classes while still in high school.

Graduation Rates

The National Center for Education Statistics maintains survey data in the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS), including the percentage of full-time, first-time degree-seeking students who complete their program of study within 150% of the normal time. Normal completion time for a certificate is less than 12 months (typically 4 to 8 months), 12-23 months for a diploma, and 24 months for a degree. SCC's graduation rate is based on those students who completed a certificate, depending on their program, in 6-17 months; a diploma, depending on their program, in 18-34 months; and a degree in 36 months.

Performance Measures

The Performance Measures for Student Success Report is the North Carolina Community College System's (NCCCS) major accountability document. This annual performance report is based on data compiled during the previous year and serves to inform colleges and the public on the performance of our 58 community colleges.

The Basic Skills Student Progress measures ensure adult students with low literacy skills are progressing academically toward basic skill attainment necessary for employment and self-sufficiency. To be included, students must have been enrolled in a class during the Basic Skills program year (July 1–June 30), have accumulated 12 or more contact hours across all classes enrolled, have initial placement based on a pre-test, and have a completed post-test. Students with an initial placement of Adult Secondary Education High (ASE High) are excluded because this is the highest Educational Functioning Level and a gain is not possible.

The student success rate in College-Level English and College-Level math courses ensure students are successfully completing credit-bearing English and credit-bearing math courses within their first three academic years. Percentages below are for first-time Associate Degree seeking and transfer pathway students passing a credit-bearing English or credit-bearing math course with a "C" or better within three years of their first term of enrollment.

The First-Year Progression measures ensure first-year students make progress toward credential completion. Percentages below are for first-time fall curriculum students who graduate before or enroll in college courses during the next fall term. The Curriculum Completion Rate measures ensure student completion and/or persistence toward a post-secondary credential. Percentages below are of first-time fall curriculum students who have either graduated, transferred, or are still enrolled during the fourth academic year with at least 42 non-developmental credit hours completed with a "C" or better.

The Licensure and Certification Passing Rate measures ensure programmatic coursework prepares students to competently practice in their chosen profession and aggregate institutional passing rates of first-time test-takers on licensure and certification exams. Exams included in this measure are state mandated exams, which candidates must pass before becoming active practitioners. Results are based on first attempts.

College Transfer Performance measures ensure the academic success of community college students who transfer to a four-year college or university. The percentages below are of students who exited NCCCS after having completed an Associate Degree and/or least 30 cumulative hours of articulated transfer credits and subsequently transferred to a four-year college or university and either graduate prior to or are still enrolled in the next fall term.
