### SCC TO MARK 50TH ANNIVERSARY WITH YEARLONG CELEBRATIONS



1971 was a monumental year. Walt Disney World opened and the Twenty-Sixth Amendment to the Constitution was passed. Locally, it marked the beginning of Stanly Community College.

State Senator Frank Patterson and Representative Lane Brown introduced legislative bills in July 1971 that created and provided funding for what was then Stanly Technical Institute. The legislation was later adopted on July 15 of that year and signifies the official establishment of Stanly Community College.

Classes were originally taught in the old Kingville High School, in what is now the E.E. Waddell Community Center. Eight faculty instructors offered classes in auto mechanics, air conditioning and refrigeration, secretarial science, industrial management, brick masonry and business to just 31 students.

Fast forward 50 years and the community college ranked the #1 Best Community College in North Carolina in 2021 (Niche. com), SCC had lots to commemorate.

The year-long schedule of festivities began with a Kick-Off Celebration on Thursday, July 15, 2021. Special guest speakers included



Dr. John Enamait, SCC President; Richard Lane Brown, III, one of the original SCC Board of Trustees, and an elected member of the North Carolina House of Representatives from 1971-1976; Bill Lawhorn, Chairman, Stanly County Board of Commissioners; and Wayne Sasser, North Carolina Representative.

To salute the thousands of students who have been a part of SCC's history and will call SCC their alma mater over the next 25 years, a time capsule was buried on the Albemarle campus. With golden shovels in hand, Kay Russell Hatley, a member of the first graduating class and Student Government Association treasurer in 1972, Hannah Barnhill, a 2021 graduate and 2021 SCC nominee for the North Carolina Community College System (NCCCS) Academic Excellence Award, and Vyktoria Iverson, a current student and the 2021 SCC nominee for the NCCCS Robert W. Scott Student Leadership Award did the honors.

The time capsule was covered by a large rock supplied by the Heavy Equipment Operations program and adorned with a plaque made by the Computer-Integrated Machining and Collision Repair and Refinishing Technology students. Among the items encapsulated were current news releases, marketing materials, a graduation tassel, a College phone directory, and a 2021-2024 strategic plan copy. The time capsule will be revealed on the College's 75th Anniversary in 2046. Starting in November 2021, the Stanly County History Museum housed an exhibit featuring College memorabilia through the decades. Dan Hazlett, who still works part-time for the College and was among the original eight faculty members, led the effort and provided much of the items on display. Former Board of Trustee members and local officials were invited to a special viewing of the collection before the display opened to the public.

As the celebration continued into 2022, the College hosted unique events for retirees, employees, students and the community.

### SCC GRADUATE FINDS HER NICHE

Brianna Harris has finally found her passion. The SCC graduate was always fascinated with the beauty industry, especially hair and makeup, but wasn't sure how it fit into her life as a career.

After graduating from high school, Brianna planned to be a nurse and worked as a Certified Nurse Assistant for about six months. Although she liked caring for people, she never really enjoyed it and pivoted to dental assisting. She began working as an Oral Surgery Assistant and earned an excellent salary, but still wasn't happy. Something still just didn't feel right.

Like so many people today, Brianna felt stuck in her job and knew that she needed to change careers, so she took action.

"My fiance's mother actually inspired me to go back to school and get my Cosmetology license," said Brianna. "She's a cosmetologist as well and knew how unhappy I was as a dental assistant. Initially, I wasn't sure about the change because I always pictured myself in the medical field with a 'nine-tofive' job. I took a leap of faith however, and enrolled at Stanly Community College in the Cosmetology Technology program and was able to earn my degree in 2019. It's the best thing I ever did for myself."

She said studying at SCC was a good experience, but admitted that it was also a

lesson in tenacity and dedication. Brianna and her classmates were in the Morton-Moffitt Cosmetology Center from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. four days a week doing coursework and working with clients. With a part-time job and homework, she was tired.

Brianna now works with her mother-in-law, Pam Alfred, and together they own a small salon in Charlotte, NC called The Secret Sanctuary.

Just like many other hairstylists around the nation, she had to adapt to the conditions of the pandemic.

"COVID-19 was a challenge for me," said Brianna. "The mask mandate made it hard because we are so up close and personal with our clients and the pandemic made it hard to build clientele."

Today, she's found her niche and enjoys the rewarding work.

"Helping people feel beautiful and confident makes me feel so good. It's the best feeling in the world when you see your client's face light up and they cannot stop smiling about their hairstyle. I also love being a person that my clients can vent to and feel comfortable around. Knowing my clients feel an instant peace when walking into my salon let's me know I made the right career choice. And I'm happy I chose SCC to help me get here."

### SCC GRADUATE COMES FULL CIRCLE

In 2004, Allen Furr had to quit taking college classes because he could not afford the gasoline needed to travel from Concord to Salisbury five days a week. Life and circumstances can certainly dictate how someone's educational journey transpires.

Years later, Allen found himself living in Albemarle and taking machining classes at Stanly Community College. He found these college courses to be more manageable than he did in his younger years.

In 2019, he graduated with honors, a 4.0 GPA and a degree in Computer-Integrated Machining. After all these years, Allen is glad he chose SCC to earn his degree.

"Studying at SCC was a wonderful experience. The faculty were extremely helpful and wanted to see me achieve my goals and are still helpful to this day," said Allen. ### SCC'S RESPIRATORY THERAPY PROGRAM RECEIVES COARC AWARD

The Commission on Accreditation for Respiratory Care (CoARC) selected Stanly Community College's Respiratory Therapy Program to receive the Distinguished Registered Respiratory Therapist (RRT) Credentialing Success Award. The annual award spotlights the CoARC's continued efforts to value the registered respiratory therapist credential as a standard of professional achievement. From a program effectiveness perspective, the CoARC views the RRT credential as a measure of a program's success in inspiring its graduates to achieve their highest educational and professional aspirations.

Tina Lewman, M.A.Ed., RRT-NPS, RCP, and Program Director for the SCC's Respiratory Therapy Program, stated, "We really appreciate this distinct recognition from CoARC. This year has been one like no other. Our faculty and clinical instructors had to become highly creative in preparing students to become graduates of the program. The pandemic highlighted the vital role of the respiratory therapist, and it is an honor to serve our healthcare communities in this profession."

In selecting programs for this recognition, the CoARC Board used objective criteria based on key accreditation metrics. Programs were required to: (1) have three or more years of outcomes data; (2) hold accreditation without a progress report; (3) document RRT credentialing success of 90% or above, and (4) meet or exceed established CoARC thresholds for TMC high cut score and retention.

### SCC EARNS CISCO NETWORKING ACADEMY GOLDEN BRIDGE AWARD

During the 2021 Global Cisco Networking Academy Partner Conference, Stanly Community College's (SCC) Cisco Academy Support Center (ASC) and Instructor Training Center (ITC) were named the Golden Bridge Award winner for North America. During the conference Cisco representatives recognized the hard work that SCC has done to support so many academies during the COVID-19 crisis.

The Cisco Networking Academy began at Stanly Community College in the fall of 1998. From its inception, SCC has been involved in teaching student classes locally, providing instructor training classes, and offering support for other Cisco Academies. SCC currently supports 180+ Cisco Networking Academies in high schools, community colleges, and universities throughout North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, Florida, Georgia, Alabama, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, Utah, New York and the District of Columbia. Additionally, SCC's local classes allow Stanly County residents to obtain advanced information technology training.

### SCC PRESIDENT APPOINTED TO AACC'S COMMISSION ON SMALL AND RURAL COLLEGES

Two Stanly County community leaders received special recognition at the 2021 North Carolina Phi Beta Lambda (PBL) State Leadership Conference.

Tamara McSwain Singletary was named the state PBL Business Person of the Year, and Martha Sue Harris Hall was presented with the PBL Alumni/Professional Division-Foundation's Distinguished Service Award. Both were nominated by the chapter at Stanly Community College. Phi Beta Lambda is the collegiate level of Future Business Leaders of America, both emphasizing business development, career planning, and leadership training.

Ms. Singletary was named the local chapter's Business Person of the Year as part of its National FBLA-PBL Week celebration in February and then submitted for state honors. She is a 38-year employee of Uwharrie Bank, formerly Bank of Stanly, and is the Vice President Investor Relations and Board of Directors Secretary for Uwharrie Capital Corp.

As a student at South Stanly High School, she won the state FBLA Future Business Leader competition. Later, as a Business and Marketing major at Appalachian State University, she won the Future Business Executive competitive event at the state PBL level and placed in the "top 5" for that event at the national level.

### SCC EMPLOYEES SELECTED AS FELLOWS FOR HARVARD UNIVERSITY'S STRATEGIC DATA PROJECT



Following a competitive selection process, Stanly Community College (SCC) employees Dr. Cindy Dean and Mr. Devin Baucom have been named Fellows of the Strategic Data Project-Career and Technical Education (SDP-CTE). Through a grant from the ECMC Foundation, the Strategic Data Project (SDP), an initiative of the Center for Education Policy Research (CEPR) at Harvard University, has launched a fellowship program to support postsecondary institutions that serve career and technical education (CTE) students.

As SDP ECMCF Fellows, Dean, the director of Institutional Effectiveness, and Baucom, the associate vice president of Advanced Manufacturing, Industry, Technology, and Trades began their year-long fellowship in the fall 2021. Over the course of the fellowship, they received extensive training in measurement and analysis, leadership and change management, and education policy. Together they will execute a strategic data project related to CTE at SCC.



The Fellowship will build the capacity of institutions to use evidence to meet the diverse needs of postsecondary CTE students.

## **GRADUATION RATES**

#### SCC IPEDS GRADUATION RATES



The National Center for Education Statistics maintains survey data in the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS), including the percentage of fulltime, first-time degree-seeking students who complete their program of study within 150% of the normal time. Normal completion time for a certificate is less than 12 months (typically 4 to 8 months), 12-23 months for a diploma, and 24 months for a degree.

SCC's graduation rate is based on those students who completed a certificate, depending on their program, in 6-17 months; a diploma, depending on their program, in 18-34 months; and a degree in 36 months.

## PERFORMANCE MEASURES

The Performance Measures for Student Success Report is the North Carolina Community College System's (NCCCS) major accountability document. This annual performance report is based on data compiled during the previous year and serves to inform colleges and the public on the performance of our 58 community colleges.

The Basic Skills Student Progress measures ensure adult students with low literacy skills are progressing academically toward basic skill attainment necessary for employment and self-sufficiency. To be included, students must have been enrolled in a class during the Basic Skills program year (July 1 – June 30), have accumulated 12 or more contact hours across all classes enrolled, have initial placement based on a pretest, and have a completed post-test. Students with an initial placement of Adult Secondary Education High (ASE High) are excluded because this is the highest Educational Functioning Level and a gain is not possible.

The student success rate in College-Level English and College-Level math courses ensure students are successfully completing credit-bearing English and credit-bearing math courses within their first three academic years. Percentages below are for first-time Associate Degree seeking and transfer pathway students passing a credit-bearing English or credit-bearing math course with a "C" or better within three years of their first term of enrollment.

The First-Year Progression measure ensures first-year students make progress toward credential completion. Percentages below are for first-time fall curriculum (credit earning) students who graduate before or enroll in college courses during the next fall term. The Curriculum Completion Rate measure ensures student completion and/or persistence toward a post-secondary credential. Percentages below are of first-time fall curriculum students who have either graduated, transferred, or are still enrolled during the fourth academic year with at least 42 non-developmental credit hours completed with a "C" or better. ensures programmatic coursework prepares students to competently practice in their chosen profession and aggregate institutional passing rates of first-time test-takers on licensure and certification exams. Exams included in this measure are state mandated exams, which candidates must pass before becoming active practitioners. Results are based on first attempts.

The College Transfer Performance measure ensures the academic success of community college students who transfer to a North Carolina public four-year college or university. The percentages below are of students who exited SCC after having completed an Associate Degree and/or at least 30 cumulative hours of articulated transfer credits and subsequently transferred to a fouryear public college or university in North Carolina and either graduated prior to or are still enrolled in the next fall term.

The Licensure and Certification Passing Rate measure




